Notes from Mr. Jorgenson

We are off to a great start. The summer has flown by and now we are going into the fall. A new school year brings new faces and new challenges for our students and our teachers. It is exciting to see our students grow and to improve, and we are very proud of all of them. Make sure to talk to students about their school year and ask them how it is going. Recently, the Shickley Community Foundation hosted foundations from other towns. McCook, Nebraska City, and Norfolk were in attendance as well as members of the Nebraska Community Foundation and Sherwood Foundation. I am currently on the Shickley Foundation board and one of the highlights was to give all of those people a tour of our school. I knew that the inevitable question of "How can you provide a quality education in such as small school?" would come up. There were a lot of mouths open when Mr. Ippensen and I began to talk about all of the awesome things we are able to accomplish in our small school. Many of you may not know, but we are able to offer the following:

8 credits of Math for high school and college credit
6 credits of English for high school and college credit
3 credits of Speech for high school and college credit
3 credits of Agribusiness Management for high school and college credit.

We offer all of these classes in-house and they are not online. They are taught by our teachers. Students have the opportunity to take at least 9 credits online as well. This means that if a student chooses, they can have 29 credits for college finished before they leave our school. That is an entire year of college done before they step on a college campus. Our teachers work very hard to make sure that our students have these opportunities. When I shared this with our visitors from other towns, they were amazed that we are able to do this. As a district, I believe we are headed in the right direction. We are producing a quality product in our graduates, a product that everyone in Shickley should be very proud of.

As third grade students entered the classroom this year, they had many questions bouncing through their minds. What are these balls doing in here? What are we going to do with them? Where are our chairs? The excitement rose as Miss Johnson told them the balls would be their chairs for the year. Research supports the use of stability chairs in the classroom and workforce. Stability balls help improve posture which leads to being more energetic! Better posture also increases blood flow to the brain, which helps students stay on task. Stability chairs also assist with handwriting because feet are flat on the floor, and students are sitting up straight. They improve behavior, help attention-challenged students, and engage the mind. Bounce on into the third grade classroom and check them out!



Eric Samuel Timm Speaks to Students

Artist and motivational speaker Eric Samuel Timm visited Shickley for a junior high and high school assembly held on Wednesday, August 26th. His live art performance addressed the important issue of how impactful the words we speak can be and encouraged students to speak "words of life" in person, online, and to themselves. He also emphasized the self-worth of every individual, no matter what has been said or done in the past.

At the beginning of his presentation, Eric created art that featured the likeness of Abraham Lincoln and discussed equality, pointing out the power that lies in written and spoken words. Later, he called upon Ben Elznic and Kale Kleinschmidt to empty tubes of toothpaste and then attempt to put the toothpaste back in the tubes. He compared the toothpaste to the words we speak, illustrating that once we say words, they can't be put back in, which is why it is so important to think before we speak and to choose words of encouragement and kindness and not words that make others feel bad. In the end, he created a painting that appeared to say "death"; however, he flipped the canvas over to reveal that it actually says "life" as a reminder to choose to speak words of life. Eric gave both of his paintings to the school. The one featuring Lincoln was given to Mr. Shipley to display in his classroom; the painting of "life" was put on display in the lobby with its permanent home to be determined at a later date.





Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

This is part two of twelve in a continuing conversation about the characteristics, skills, and abilities of a successful student, as defined by Shickley Public School.

A successful student is creative and innovative.

Creativity and innovation in problem solving can be marked by the ability to look at a difficult problem and solve it in a creative or innovative way. There are examples of this throughout history: the Wright Brothers combined attributes of a bird and a bicycle to build the first airplane; John Boyd, the fighter pilot and instructor, used to give students parts from a tank, a bicycle, a motor boat, and skis in order to build a snow mobile. Even here in our community, way back in 1940, John Alfs looked at silage chopping, and patented a better way. The common thread between these three people and their situations, and the countless other inventors and problem solvers throughout history, is that these people didn't consider a problem unsolvable; they looked for different or innovative and creative ways to solve the problem, using things they knew. We are working to develop this same mindset in our students, which is an essential part of our spiral curriculum—building off existing knowledge to develop new and different skills, abilities, and understandings. This isn't done by a simple transition from A to B to C; building new knowledge requires the creative and innovative skills to see what can't readily be seen, and the willingness to try something new, even when it is difficult and scary.
